START A BIBLE STUDY

Engaging in God's Word for information, formation, and transformation is vital for the spiritual health and growth of believers. As followers of Jesus, it is essential to maintain an ongoing relationship with God through His Word. Engaging in Scripture is one of the fundamental ways He speaks to us. It doesn't matter where you are on your journey with the Lord – whether just starting with Jesus (SEEKER) or in a relationship for many years (STUDENT), engaging in Scripture is imperative at every level of faith. We use the terms "seeker" and "student" strictly as a convenience to indicate familiarity with Scripture. You may identify with both categories and going deeper into the Word is always encouraged. So, if you feel challenged by the content, that is perfectly okay. Always ask your leader or Corps Officer questions to better understand what you are reading and comprehending.

One proven discipline for staying and growing in God's Word is through a small-group Bible study. Studying His Word in a small group offers secure and non-threatening opportunities for people to learn from the Scriptures and build authentic relationships. The key, however, is creating quality, intentional Bible study groups.

HERE ARE SOME STEPS TO CONSIDER IN YOUR PREPARATION:

1. SEEK GOD'S WISDOM

You may be saying, "Of course, God wants people to study His Word." Don't run ahead without prayer and seeking His wisdom. Seeking God's wisdom will help you clarify your vision to answer all the "who, what, where, when, and how" details. When we wait on the Lord, He will unfold His plan – which is always best. He will give you a focus in one direction rather than chasing off in multiple directions.

| 2. IDENTIFY YOUR TARGET GROUP |

- Service Groups: for believers and non-believers who serve alongside one another in ministry.
- Seeker Groups: groups led by believers but for non-believers. Groups that spend much time dealing with the issues non-believers are considering before coming to Christ.
- Support Groups: groups for believers and non-believers that support attendees through personal difficulties.

When you decide what kind of group is needed, you can then select what resources fit your group.

Facilitators can initiate discussion and serve as the prime mover of conversation. |
